First Fruits Farm Service Opportunity


Please join the Mercy community in serving at First_Fruits_Farm on Saturday, October 10th, from 9:00 until 11:30 a.m.

MAGIC NATION BOOK CLUB



Join the Magic Nation Book Club as we read our second book, Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption by Bryan Stevenson. According to GoodReads.com, Just Mercy is "A powerful true story about the potential for mercy to redeem us, and a clarion call to fix our broken system of justice—from one of the most brilliant and influential lawyers of our time. Bryan Stevenson was a young lawyer when he founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending those most desperate and in need: the poor, the wrongly condemned, and women and children trapped in the farthest reaches of our criminal justice system. One of his first cases was that of Walter McMillian, a young man who was sentenced to die for a notorious murder he insisted he didn't commit. The case drew Bryan into a tangle of conspiracy, political machination, and legal brinksmanship—and transformed his understanding of

mercy and justice forever. *Just Mercy* is at once an unforgettable account of an idealistic, gifted young lawyer's coming of age, a moving window into the lives of those he has defended, and an inspiring argument for compassion in the pursuit of true justice."
